The skills being challenged were excellent for hand eye coordination as they used sturdy plastic hammers to put long thick nails into the pumpkin. Then creatively stretching rubber bands from nail to nail was equally challenging. There was an expected surprise for our sensory table that everyone just loved! We had sensory and gel beads with containers, funnels, scoops, and cups. The texture felt cool, wet and just a neat sensory experience. This week we will turn our focus and attention on our community and family. The next few months are a time of year when families celebrate various holidays within their culture. Some may help or volunteer more at various events that serve our communities. At home you can take this opportunity to talk with your child about the traditions your family has and why you celebrate holidays. In science we will talk about where rain comes from and the why's and how's of clouds as we do our cloud experiment. It's a simple yet exciting experiment to watch! It's really a great science and math lesson that is fun to play with in the end! Nearly all the activities that I plan include concepts in math, science, reading, fine motor skills and cooperation. Fine Motor Skills

The National Association of the Education of Young Child (NAEYC) states that many of your child's daily activities—like getting dressed, eating, and writing—require control of small muscles in the hands. We call these skills fine motor skills. Your child can do more things for himself when he has opportunities to practice these skills. There are lots of activities that can increase muscle strength and coordination, preparing children for more advanced skills, from writing with a pencil, using a computer mouse, or playing a musical instrument. Help your child build fine motor skills at home by providing opportunities to...

Set the table
Hold knives, forks, and spoons to eat
Pour juice into a cup
Wipe the table with a sponge
Help with meals—stir, shake, chop, cut, and mix
Get dressed—button, zip, snap, buckle, and fasten
Use Velcro tabs
Open and close containers with lids
Cut with child-safe scissors
Finger paint
Use a paintbrush

Play with playdough and clay—roll, smoosh, pat, pound, and use tools like popsicle sticks or stamps

Draw, scribble, or write with crayons, pencils, and markers
Put together puzzles
Place pegs in a board
Build with small blocks
Play board games
Play with puppets

When I plan the weekly lessons I am consistently doing activities, in all subject areas, that promotes your child's fine motor skills. Not only are these muscle groups vital for later school successes, it is also building your child's confidence to take on more challenging tasks.
